Clan Johnston (Johnstone)

Clan Motto: “Nunquam non paratus”
which means “Never Unprepared.”

The Johnstons (Johnstones) whose name derives from “John’s Town,” were a powerful border clan located in Annandale. The legend is that the Chief of the Johnstons, while at the Scottish Court, heard of a plan by the English king to dispose of Robert the Bruce in favor of John of Baliol. He sent Bruce a spur with a feather tied to it indicating “flight with speed.” Bruce acted on the warning and escaped safely.

The earliest formal written record of the clan is from 1194 wherein Sir John Johnstone’s son, Gilbert, is named. Later, in 1296, Sir John Johnston, knight of the county of Dumfries, signed the Ragman Roll in 1296 by which the Johnston Clan of Dumfries swore allegiance to King Edward I. Sir John’s descendants were rewarded by being appointed as Wardens of the Western Marches in 1381.

James Johnstone, the Chief of the Clan, was created Lord Johnston of Lochwood by Charles I in 1633. His eldest son, James, was rewarded for his family’s loyalty by Charles II, who created the Earldom of Annandale for him. In 1701, William, 3rd Earl of Hartfell/2nd Earl of Annandale & Hartfell was raised to the rank of Marquess of Annandale. William held many important offices including Secretary of State and President of the Privy Council. Upon his death, his half-brother, George succeeded him, however, George was found incompetent and the family title was declared dormant.

Unsuccessful attempts were made in the 19th century to revive the Annandale titles. However, finally, in 1983 based on the charter of 1662, the Earldom of Annandale & Hartfell was re-established. The Annandale families were reconfirmed as Chief’s of the Johnstons.



The original Clan Seat was Lockwood Castle (L) from which some remnants remain. The current Clan Seat is Raehills Estates (R), 15 miles North of Dumfries, bought by the Johnstones in 1780. It is the home of Earl David Johnstone and his wife, Penny as well as a popular sporting resort offering shooting and fishing on the River Annan.


